New Catholic Junior High School OK'd

A Catholic junior high school will be opened in Elmira for the 1969-70 school year. It was decided by the Chemung County Catholic School Board Wednesday night. Many Area Ticket Holders Wishful

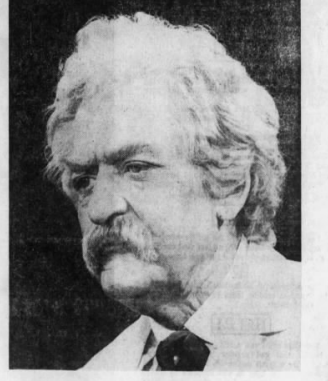

Police Sight UFO Near Lakes

WATKINS GLEN—Police of three counties, Schuyler, Yates and Seneca, reported an unidentified flying object in the skies of the lake country, Wednesday night. The object was reported by Schuyler County Deputy Robert Przygoda, Seneca County Deputy Joseph McDonald of Waterloo and members of the Penn Yan Police Department. Przygoda said he was parked on the Seneca-Schuyler County line of Rt. 414, when his attention to the UFO was attracted by McDonald. McDonald met Przygoda at the county line to transport an injured man to the Waterloo Hospital. "I was watching this light heading south high above Seneca Lake for some time," Sheriff's Deputy Fred Loman Penn Yan Elementary School said they witnessed what was described as an unidentified light in the sky over the village. The two officers discussed the sighting of the object. Przygoda said he got out of the car and looked skyward. "It made no noise. There were sparkling flashing lights in many colors. It finally disappeared over Watkins Glen," he said.
